## Grapevine Nature Notes.

I had a telephone call from a dear 94 year old lady who lives in the village this morning to say she had seen a yellow butterfly and did I want to make a note of that. Yes I did and I am so grateful, it must have been a Brimstone as it is always one of the first to be seen, a sign that spring may be on the way. I try to keep some sort of record of the first sightings of these beautiful insects and I see that I saw one in my garden in 2005 on the 11<sup>th</sup> February. Did that indicate a good summer can anyone remember?



Geoff and Angela my other good source of bird information, have had about a dozen Reed Buntings feeding regularly as do I, we just wonder why there has been such an increase in these birds in the last couple of years. Not many reeds

in Stockcross. I have had all the usual and much loved regulars with perhaps more Chaffinches and Goldfinches than past years and, I think a Red Poll although I needed it to return to the bird feeder to be sure. It could, I suppose have been a Linnet. Whichever, it was a first in the garden and quite exciting. I find the antics of both Robin and Blackbird highly amusing as they try to copy Blue Tits and the like, feeding while hanging onto fat balls. At least they are learning and in a few years time we might find they are proficient at hanging -on rather than their normal ground feeding habit.

For some reason there have not been as many frogs in my pond but I seem to have just as much frog spawn. I managed to put some in a plastic container so that my grandchildren can watch them develop. It is mighty difficult to take a small amount of spawn without falling in head first, I had to hang on to both children causing much hilarity.

The children and I had a wonderful evening of the 26<sup>th</sup> February, which turned out to be surprisingly warm and damp, helping the toads cross Church Road by collecting them in a bucket. We just had to shut our ears to the awful squelch as the occasional car went past. There was a problem trying to get them through the fence to the pond (I fear at Stockcross House) as there did not seem any way we could get them through the netting fence so we put them in the wood. Not sure they appreciated that move, perhaps there could be a toad gate made!

I am probably in trouble too as my four year old grandson now thinks the name for toads is double decker! At last 'my' blackbird has begun to build in the ivy on the fence thankfully taking some of the mass of moss in my lawn. I could do with a squadron of blackbirds.

I am now hearing the Chiff Chaff in the wood which I find just amazing, within five days of my records for the past five years, how do they do it!

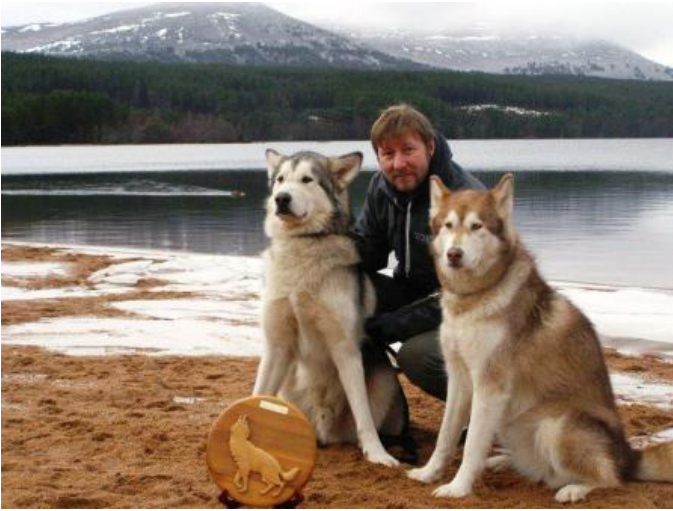

## Richard Martin 1941 – 2011



Richard was born at Elcot but moved to Shepherd's Farm when his father became Head Gamekeeper for the Sutton Estates. He spent most of his young life in Stockcross and attended Welford & Wickham and Park House Schools. When he left school he worked for Stradlings Garage which was in Northbrook St and then

later joined Marks & Spencer where he worked for 26 years retiring aged 60 in 2001.

He was a keen sportsman and played cricket for Donnington and football for Stockcross. He was a founder member and Treasurer of the Rising Sun Golf Society and also a founder member of the Deanwood Golf Club. He was club Captain at Deanwood in 1997 and was always ready to help out with anything that needed doing for the club.

He spent many a happy hour in the Rising Sun in his youth and also worked behind the bar there, sharing Sunday evenings with Mr Pike! What a duo!

He cut the grass in Stockcross Churchyard for many years even after he left the village. Right up until his untimely death he remained a valued member of the volunteer maintenance team.

Despite or maybe because he had had a triple bypass operation about 20 years ago, he enjoyed life and the good things in it. That he will be missed by many was evidenced by the numbers of people who filled Stockcross Church to celebrate his life. He is buried in the Churchyard that he tended so well near to his parents and sister.

It was with great shock that we heard of Richard's sudden death and our sympathy and thoughts go to his wife, Laura, family and friends. We are indebted to Richard for all his efforts and loyalty to the church over many years and finding someone with as much dedication is never easy however if you feel you can spare sometime to do some cutting and strimming during the season then we would very much appreciate it. ## Au Revoir but not Goodbye

After 17 years at the Post Office, its time for me to hang up my pinney and for Tim to put away his date stamp. Yes we are retiring and moving into our house in Stockcross.

When we first came here there were buses to Newbury only on Thursdays and Saturdays. The main supermarket in the town was Sainsburys in the Kennet Centre, most of the Sutton House's were occupied by either Sutton employees or retired employees. There were very few young children living in the village and there was no Newbury bypass. Pensions and family allowance were paid using a book, weights were in pounds and ounces and we had other Post Offices in the surrounding villages. Now we have several buses, several supermarkets, several less Post Offices and unfortunately a lot of the old characters of the village have passed away. But now we have many young families living in the village.



We have refurbished the shop twice and the Post Office has been computerised. It's been hard work but we survived the threats of closure and leave the business in very good shape for those that follow. For this we thank our loyal customers, including the many from other villages in the area, who know that without a village shop you lose the heart out of the village. Our thanks also go to Sir Richard Sutton's Estates for their continuing support of our vision.

We have many happy memories of our time here at the Post Office but our proudest moment was in July 2007 when, for our services to the community, we were invited by the Queen to the Royal Garden Party at Buckingham Palace.

As we move on to pastures green (or in our case a green campervan) we are leaving Stockcross Village Store in the capable hands of Stuart and Heather Gilmour from Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> April. Please come and meet them, give them your support and be part of the next chapter in the story of Stockcross Post Office and Village Shop.

## Stockcross Two O'clock Crowd

Our February meeting was most enjoyable thanks to Lynn Kirby who gave us a fascinating informal talk about her experiences working at a leper colony in Malaya as it was then called, in the late 50s.

Lynn's husband was in the army based in Kuala Lumpur and she was asked to put her nursing knowledge to good use by helping with the administration of tests being run on patients suffering from leprosy at a time when a cure was still being sought. Lynn showed us photos of the large colony which had been a happy community in a lovely valley, in which life carried on fairly normally for most sufferers. She explained how the colony was run and showed photos of some of the buildings and people who worked and lived there. Lynn has recently been in contact with the author of a newly published book about the colony and this woman was one of the children taken away at birth to live outside the colony until, happily, her parents were well and able to look after her. Viv gave out copies of 'The Island' by Victoria Hislop which tells a fictitious story of a similar colony.

Another talk, in March, was on 'Kinesiology, a Holistic Therapy' by Ros Kitson, a practitioner who lives in Marsh Benham. Ros explained that many ailments are caused by stress and when the roots causes are understood, then the physical symptoms can be treated. Ros even had some of us volunteering our muscles for demonstrating negative and positive responses.
